When we were first beginning, trying to get the border together, I got a little miffed, because he was taking the pieces that



were in front of me. "We're on the same team" he reminded me. Sometimes it's hard to remember that we are all on the same team. Really, ALL of us. Goodness knows a lot of times it doesn't feel that way in our world, we often see people operating from a win-lose mentality, and not just in politics. Dear Members and Friends,

Our business year runs from July 1-June 30. Thus, during our July Board meeting we elected officers. Jim Carillon and I will continue to serve as treasurer and president respectively. Scott Shaw took the office of Vice President. Robbie Madden is serving as secretary however, only until we find a non-board member to serve in this manner.

So, we are looking for someone to take minutes for our board meetings. This is a fabulous way to know what is going on at UUCSV. We meet the third Monday of every month from 6-8pm. The minutes are approved via email within one week after the meeting. Then the secretary posts the approved minutes and treasurers' report on the bulletin board plus files any documents associated with the meeting. The secretary is an officer of the board, however does not vote. If this is how you would like to serve UUCSV please contact board member Emory Underwood.

One concern of the board is how to create fund raisers that won't drain the pockets of our congregants. In the fiscal year 2010-2011 we will raise \$5,000 to meet our projected budget. Secondly, the board is preparing for the absence of our minister in January. Since our Worship Associate Team will plan an increased number of services they will need more members to join this group. See Sally Beth if working on this committee is how you would like to serve.

Thirdly, the board is trying to figure out how to fund the Ministerial Search Committee (MSC). With a budget that does not include money for this committee we are moving one step at a time to get them up and running. With the support of the board the MSC is planning a one day retreat with a Thomas Jefferson District consultant. They have begun to meet and are eager to fulfill the charge the congregation gave them.

She and they will share with us how they came to make the film Life Without that shares their experiences and challenges as children of incarcerated parents. Excerpts of the film will be shown

Melissa does her work through the non-profit Center for Community Transitions and, among many activities, facilitates parenting classes in the Mecklenburg County jail. Melissa's earlier documentary, Perversion of Justice won the Change Maker Award and, through one woman's story, recounted the serious problems with Federal Sentencing Guidelines and drug conspiracy laws. Melissa holds degrees in philosophy and theater from Stephens College in Columbia, Missouri, and a Master of Divinity Degree from Starr King School for the Ministry in Berkeley, California. She is married to Rev. Jay Leach and together they try to keep up with daughter Annie.



Religious Education Corner

In the past month I've experienced a pilgrimage to Boston with our oldest youth and also helped care for some of our littlest UUs in the nursery on Sunday mornings. We have a young set of one and two-year-olds in our nursery/ preschool coming up this year and it strikes me how the cycle is beginning again. Preschool is mostly a time to learn cooperative play, invoking (not in any concrete form in the minds of our babies, but in ours) our first guiding principle of "the inherent worth and dignity of every person". Our babies learn this by playing together, learning to share, and beginning to understand that there are others out there different from them. As they grow, they will learn more about respecting differences, making friends, looking for their own truths, and appreciating the beauty in the world around us. I treasure the idea that we begin again, and as William Ellery Channing so aptly worded it "the great end in religious instruction is not to stamp our minds upon the young, but to stir up their own; not to make them see with our eyes, but to look inquiringly and steadily with their own." I'm looking forward with great anticipation to working with all of our children and youth in the year ahead.

Religious Education Classes

We've had a great series of summer programs this year, with many new volunteers stepping forward to offer their talents! We do continue to need preschool caregivers through the summer. Church safety policy dictates that we have two adults or one adult and a teen assistant present in the classroom at all times. We've had lots of little visitors this summer, so please consider helping

one Sunday! Below is a list of what we'll be offering through August.

Spirit Play

I participated in a workshop on this topic in late June with the Asheville church which focused on this amazing teaching methodology. The basic premise of Spirit Play is storytelling. A story is presented, along with numerous props and materials to capture the audience, and then the children take time to answer questions of wonder and conduct their "work" for the morning (work consisting of acting out the story among themselves, drawing, making something, or drawing upon previous stories with questions or games). We hope to incorporate some Spirit Play mornings into our regular curriculum this fall and as some summer programs next year.

Religious Education Teachers Needed

We still need several teachers to help with our classes this fall. Working with our children and youth is one of the most rewarding volunteer positions you can fill. We will have teams of a minimum of four again so that you would have two Sundays off to attend services. You would only be responsible for teaching one lesson per month, and assist the second Sunday.
