Camping out in the woods until the city razed their camp, she told us how difficult it was to be without hot water. Showering from a 2 liter soda bottle is far from satisfying, so being able to have a clean bed and a hot meal is a huge and wonderful thing for many of these women. Some will go on to break off the grip of homelessness, but many, whom we see over and over seem to be unable to care for themselves. So thank you, volunteers, for giving of yourselves.

Summer camp! What a fun time for the kids who attended. They created, and went on adventures, seeing how coffee is made, checking out the streams and making musical instruments to share with the parents in a jam session at the end of the week. Thank you to all who made this possible.

And....many thanks to the grounds- keepers, for the faithful mowing and care-taking. Sometimes, we don't take the time to say thanks to all those who take the time to do the little (and big) things that make our congregation the wonderful entity that it is.

The minister's start-up workshop, usually scheduled within the first month or two of a new ministry, is an opportunity to plan for how the minister and the leadership will work together to assure a successful ministry. During the course of the workshop, we will review working styles, develop a covenant of how you will work together, examine assumptions and expectations, and discuss how you will approach conflict when it develops. It's designed for members of the board, committee on ministry, search committee, and committee chairs (worship, RE, etc). The workshop for a part-time consulting minister typically lasts between three and five hours and can be customized to the congregation's specific needs. It's sometimes helpful to have an hour at the end just with the board and minister to talk about their specific relationship. The start-up workshop is available at no cost to congregations.

Islam and the Significance of Ramadan

Dr. Afaf Omer

Our speaker will be Dr. Afaf Omer.

She is currently Associate Professor of
Sociology at UNC-Asheville, where she
has been teaching since 1996, with the exception of one
year spent as a Fulbright Senior Scholar at the University
of Qatar and two years as Chief of the Centre for Women at
the U.N. Economic and Social Commission for West Asia
located in Beirut, Lebanon.

Born in Sudan, Dr. Omer came to the U.S. as a United Nations Fund for Population Activities fellow to Princeton University. While writing her doctoral dissertation at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, an Islamic fundamentalist military coup took over the government in her country. Because of her activism as well as family connections, it was unsafe for her to return to Sudan. She was offered a position at the University of Michigan while hoping the political situation in Sudan would improve. When it did not and her visiting-fellow visa expired, she applied for asylum so she could stay in the United States. She found a position at UNC-A and won a Population Council grant to carry out post-doctoral research at Brown University. She writes, "An economist and demographer, my interests broadened to include Sociology. The changes in my country and my life sparked my interests in the areas of human rights, in particular, women's rights in Muslim societies. Thus adding Islam to my areas of expertise."

May God Have Mercy on Your Soul: Some Thoughts on the American Death Penalty and Calling

How does the death penalty fit with our spiritual lives? Many of us have a

fairly intuitive sense about the appropriateness of the punishment, but have we really chewed on it? What do we know about how it all works? Is the process fair and reliable? And what does our faith (whatever that is!) teach us about it? What is our response? I hope to give you a few things to think about as I describe some of what I've learned in my recent journey into and through law school, and into what I believe is my "capital-R Right work."

Kathy LaMotte started Cornell Law School at age 50 and is amazed to find that she is an attorney and fellow of the South Carolina Death Penalty Resource and Defense Center. Her heart still lives in Black Mountain, as do her parents. She is a member of the Swannanoa Valley Friends (Quaker) Meeting. She will not ask you for money, nor attempt to add to the list of things you "should" be doing, but would enjoy the chance to share some thoughts.




Women's Spirituality Group
