
## Annual Budget Drive Planning Committee Calls for Volunteers

## Holiday Ideas from the Green Sanctuary

By choosing carefully we can have a green Christmas tree. A live Christmas tree (either in a pot or balled-and-burlapped) is by far the best choice if you have a yard where you can plant it after the holidays.



By the same token, a cut tree is still greener than an artificial one. If put through a chipper after the holidays, this tree can be recycled as mulch.

A Norfolk Island pine makes a perfectly beautiful Christmas tree. This houseplant can be kept outdoors during the summer, and brought back indoors before frost.

The least green choice of all is a NEW artificial tree. Often made of plastic, these sometimes have wood trunks, which may have been harvested unsustainably in China. In the past, the trunks were the source of dangerous wood boring beetles that pose serious threats to American forests and trees.

Buying a previously used artificial tree is a very green choice. With this purchase, you're reusing a perfectly good item that would otherwise end up in the landfill.



## British Unitarian Shares Nobel Peace Prize

A British Unitarian is the shared winner of the Nobel Prize for Peace, along with his colleagues on the Intergovernmental Panel for Climate Change (IPCC) and Al Gore, in the awards announced on 12 October 2007.

The British man is Geoff Levermore, a UK-nominated Lead Author on the IPCC Working Group that deals with mitigating the effects of climate change. He is Professor of the Built Environment at the University of Manchester, and he helped write and edit a chapter on "Residential and commercial buildings" in the IPCC's "Fourth Assessment Report," due to be published later this year.
