

To Do One Thing Well

Religious traditions the whole world over ask adherents often to do one thing well. For some, it's the Golden Rule. For others, it is keeping kosher. Prior to moving to Charlotte, she lived in Albuquerque, New Mexico where she completed a year-long chaplain residency at Presbyterian Hospital. She received her Bachelor of Arts in Psychology and Religious Studies from the University of Rochester, and earned her Master of Divinity from Harvard Divinity School, where she was awarded the Williams Fellowship. She was ordained as a Minister in December 2009 and was called to serve at the Piedmont Unitarian Universalist Church in 2010.
