Religious Education Corner



Dare we think it's spring yet? I always tread lightly when we have these warm days in February, remembering that some of our biggest snow storms have been in March. But it's also hard not to relish these beautiful days and see how our children and youth have grown through yet another year in RE. These next couple of months will be busy ones for the children, youth, teachers, and RE leaders as we finish up our curriculums, plan for the summer and next year's curriculum offerings, and work towards our annual RE service scheduled for May 22, including a bridging ceremony for our graduating senior, Aaron. Spring is coming. New beginnings. New hopes.

Classroom Activities and Attendance

We continue to have two or three of our littlest UUs spending their time in the infant/preschool room every Sunday. We have had one older preschooler register with us in the past month, along with three new students in the K-4 class. The K-4 class has been studying Buddhism and will wind up their year focusing on our UU principles and faith traditions. This is the busiest of our classes, with an average of six to seven children each week. The Neighboring Faiths class has been studying Islam, and will next look at the A. M. E. Zion church experience. Attendance in this class is generally two or three youth most Sundays. The senior high group held their second covenant meeting for the spring semester on February 13, focusing on the revolution in Egypt, service work, and some sort of fun goopy project that Judy planned for the morning! They will help with a Habitat service project (see below), and are following that with a social event of

bowling. This group will hold another covenant group meeting on March 13.

Senior High YRUU (Young Religious Unitarian Universalists) Youth Group Activities

On Saturday February 26, our great group of teens will be helping our social action group's Habitat for Humanity project with books! The group will be packing up a very large collection of books from a friend of the church, and will then donate them to the Habitat Homestore. Emily will be joining other youth from around western North Carolina at the SUUPER CON (youth conference) on April 1 - 3 at the Asheville church. CONs are a great way for youth to connect to the broader UU community, be creative, have fun, and talk about important social issues.

Summer Camp

The Board has approved our proposal for our very first UUCSV summer camp program, *Journey for the Earth: Daily Travel Adventures*. This half-day program, scheduled for July 18 - 22, 2011, will be open to rising first through fourth graders, and will focus on our seventh principle, the interconnected web of life. Each day's adventure will focus on a different topic of water, energy conservation, sustainable gardening, recycling, and the animal world. Aaron, our youth representative on the RE committee, has spent a lot of time helping to plan for this week, and will be one of our youth counselors. He will be taking an infant/child CPR course in the next couple of weeks, part of our safety policy for the camp. Aaron and I will be detailing more specific daily activities and pro-

gramming in the next few weeks. More detailed registration materials will go out to families soon.

Camp Expo

As part of our publicity for the summer camp this year, Aaron and I will attend the Summer Camp Expo at Biltmore Square Mall on March 5, from 11-4. This will be not only an opportunity to market the camp program, but we will have lots of information there about RE and the church. The RE committee and the Board have been working together to update our church brochure, and that will be available for families to pick up. We have such a great church community, and we want others to know about it!

Intergenerational Service

Please join us on March 6 for a fully intergenerational service as we celebrate the many ways we are connected in our church community. Many of our children and youth, partnered with each other and with adults, will be participating in what promises to be a deeply moving service.
